Their marriage lasted no longer than two weeks. Her NRI husband left within 15 days of her marriage and flew to New Zealand and never returned. After her repeated attempts to reach her husband, Komal could not track him down. She even wrote to the New Zealand Parliament in which she spoke out against the law, which does not allow a woman to meet her husband residing in another country. She even received a reply from the President of New Zealand, but that was not helpful. It was then that she realized that she was building her own identity, which would surpass her former identity as a woman. She appeared for the UPSC Civil Services Exam and after many hardships, in her third attempt in 2012, she took the exam. Komal Ganatra is now an administrative officer in the Ministry of Defence. Komal began her career as a government teacher in a small village in Gujarat. She was preparing for the exam without the help of the internet, smartphones, laptops or English newspapers. She traveled every weekend from her school to Ahmedabad to prepare for the exam. Not only that, for her UPSC Civil Services exam she even had to travel 300 km from Gujarat to Mumbai to appear for examination. And she did it, with hard work and zeal and all the other things that motivating speakers talk about. Komal Ganatra passed the UPSC examination for civil service in 2012 and secured an overall India ranking of 591. Komal's, however, is no ordinary UPSC success story. She had to retreat from a quagmire of despair and hopelessness to study for the civil service exam. In this article, we bring you the inspiring story of Komal Ganatra, which is a pillar of strength and resilience for both men and women. Komal Ganatra Background Story Komal Ganatra was married to a New Zealand businessman in 2008 at the age of 26. However, her husband's parents began to demand dowry from her and threw her out of her house because she was unable to produce enough dowry. Her husband left her and went to New Zealand. All this happened just two weeks after their wedding day. A distraught Komal turned to the police and government agencies to ensure justice. However, nothing has come of this. She then moved back to her parents' house in Savarkundla, Gujarat. Back in her hometown, she and her parents faced the taunts of relatives and neighbors. Komal, who had a degree in engineering, then decided to live alone in a remote village about 40 km from her hometown. She began working there as a primary school teacher and lived on a Salary of Rs 5000 per month. She began to prepare for public service there. Their inability to get help from the government motivated them to become part of the system and bring about a change in that system. Komal Ganatra graduated in Engineering from Rajkot Government Polytechnic. She also earned a BA degree from Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar Open University and a primary teacher Certificate from a college in her hometown. UPSC Preparation There were practical difficulties in their remote residence such as intermittent power supply and the lack of adequate guidance for their IAS preparation. Komal couldn't get an English newspaper there, which is so important for the daily routine in the UPSC exam. The daily news articles required for UPSC are available in a crisp, re-read format in our daily news analysis. However, she briefly went to the Sardar Patel Institute of Public Administration (SPIPA), an institution run by the Gujarat government to train IAS aspirants. IAS preparation includes understanding the nuances of the exam, prioritizing topics, conducting sham tests, and knowing how to write answers. Related links: Amid the constant taunts of relatives who spent hours travelling to classes and doing the numerous tests, getting up at night to study and making sure their problems didn't bother them mentally, IAS Komal Ganatra emerged as a fighter. Komal Ganatra has never had to deal with gender inequality or fight for her rights, as her father prioritizes education. He introduced her to the Union Public Service Commission (UPSC) when she was barely four years old. While this may not seem unusual given the weight of good education in the present age, this kind of education was very rare in the 1980s, especially in the rural parts of our country. Komal, who hails from Savarkundla, a small town in Amreli district, Gujarat, was given enough freedom to make her own decisions, unlike her friends, who were bound by rigid boundaries and relentless restraints. She was always encouraged to think independently and to form one's own opinion. In an exclusive interview with The Better India (TBI), Komal talks about her childhood experiences and says that parenting makes a big difference and determines what kind of person you will be. My father always taught me to dream big and to form my own identity. His teachings helped me immensely to overcome challenges at every point. It was the power to act, to speak and to think which enabled Komal to follow their dreams. She not only completed her studies in Sanskrit, Hindi and English literature, but also pursued her passion for the performing arts and obtained a Visharad degree. Source: Facebook/Komal Ganatra Soon she started preparing for the UPSC, and it was during the same time when their marriage was fixed in 2008 with an NRI from New Zealand. For the sake of her family and in-laws, she gave up her ambitions and was married at the age of 26. Although Komal was married in an educated family, it seemed that family education had brought no enlightenment. Her in-laws demanded dowry and even asked her to leave the house when she refused to be part of such a regressive practice. Within 15 days of their marriage, her husband went to New Zealand to never return. The devastated Komal and her family. There were times when she was almost convinced that life was over. But her upbringing gave Komal the strength to take her life to task. Taking revenge was never my plan, but I deserved justice. So I acted to set the right example for people who believe they can get away with misconduct, and also for those who believe that justice is not for everyone, says the 36-year-old. Komal turned to the police and the government, but to no avail. She even wrote to the Governor-General of New Zealand with the hope of finding her husband. Although she received an answer, it did nothing good. Komal's determination to enter the system of government and bring about change grew. At some point, I realized that the persecution of a man who left me would only disturb my spiritual peace. I channeled all my emotions and feelings to delete the UPSC exams. To escape social shame, Komal moved to a small village in Bhavnagar. There she took a job as a government teacher with a meagre salary of Rs 5,000. Although her qualifications helped her secure her livelihood, Komal sought to bring about social change. At first, Komal knew she had minimal resources to prepare for UPSC. The village where she taught did not have access to the Internet, smartphones, English newspapers or laptops. She had no money to buy books. After studying in Gujarati Medium, she was also worried. But as they say, a real fighter sees hurdles as opportunities to grow. I had no idea how civilian aspirants were preparing for the trials and that, strangely enough, I was helped to stay calm. From Monday to Friday I would teach, and at the weekend I traveled to Ahmedabad to take classes. Not only that, their examination centre in Mumbai. But few journeys are as difficult and hopeful as Komal, who is an inspiration to many and also an example of how fates can be rewritten. Asked what some of the key exploits of her experience were, she said: Even now, life for women is not a cake walk. For them, I would say that financial independence and education are important. A woman should never be dependent on anyone; be a strong pillar for their loved ones instead. And for all the civilian aspirants who are working hard to erase the exams, Komal says there will be many things or people who will try to tear you down. In such times, one must believe in oneself.
